Item 2 - Community Description

Description from previous plan:

Lumbering activity in Maple Grove Twp. began in the 1850's. Much of the land had significant marketable timber and much of the land was purchased by outside timber investors. Homesteaders moved into much of the area of the Township following the American Civil War period.

The Township came into existence in October of 1878. Population grew slowly in the Township, and the primary early income was through timber operations. A significant boom occurred in 1888 when two railroads were built through the Township.

By the turn of the century lumbermen in the area began marketing cut-over lands through the New York National Land Company. One of the sites was the location of the crossing of the two railroads, known as Manistee Crossing, located in Maple Grove Township. This location became the company's first major development. The community planned especially for Finnish Immigrants with a central village named "Kaleva" after the epic poem Kalevala.

Maple Grove Township through the years experienced agricultural activity which mainly ceased over time due to poor soils, but these same sandy soils filtered abundant groundwater through the many wetlands of the area which fed local cold-water streams. These streams overtime were stocked with species of trout and salmon and led to an abundant fishery in the area.

Portions of land within the Township were held by the State of Michigan and became portions of the Pere Marquette State Forest. These forested lands offer recreational opportunities for locals and visitors alike.

Maple Grove Township provides recreational opportunities on State and School Forest land holdings within the Township. The three identified recreation sites within the Township each provide access to water resources, which displays the importance of allowance for access to water.

Two of the recreation sites are located adjacent to each other along Bear Creek and a Beaver Creek, a tributary of Bear Creek. One site owned by the State of Michigan along Bear Creek has been identified by the DNR as an important access to Bear Creek. The other site located on property owned by the Kaleva Norman Dickson (KND) School System, has frontage on Beaver Creek and is immediately adjacent to the State land. Each of these sites are important access points for small stream water access, and each is utilized primarily for fishing access.

The Lemon Lake access is an important location for water access during both the summer and winter months. With the largest amount of use during the winter for ice-fishing.

The Township has worked closely with the Village and the KND school system when planning for recreation. This established relationship is important to successfully implementing recreation activities and planning site improvements for the whole of the community, and Manistee County.

Trail segments which cross the Township and converge in the Village of Kaleva, should be looked upon for additional connections to communities to the south and west.



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Administrative Structure - Maple Grove Township
