#### 1. Welcome and Introductions

Tim Nemecek, Vice Chair, called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m with the Pledge of Allegiance recited and noted to add to future agendas.

#### 2. Public Comment

None.

#### 3. Review Proposed Agenda

Motion by Tim Nemecek, supported by Annemarie Conway, to approve the April 24, 2025 MMPC agenda as presented. Motion carried unanimously.





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#### 4. Approval of March 27, 2025 Meeting Minutes

It was noted that Julia Dross, Charlevoix County Clerk, was in attendance at the March 27 MMPC meeting.

Motion by Tim Nemecek, supported by Victor VanDeventer, to approve the March 27, 2025 MMPC Meeting Minutes as amended. Motion carried unanimously.

Jonathan Scheel, Chair, arrived at 10:11 a.m. and resumed chairing the meeting from Tim Nemecek.

#### 5. EGLE Presentation

Tracy Tomazsewski, EGLE Recycling Specialist, provided a Materials Management Planning presentation (attached).

#### 6. Bylaw Review, Discussion, and Consideration of Approval

Mathew Cooke made a clarification that the reasoning behind the DPA listed as calling special meetings, schedule changes, identifying place of meetings, and meeting attendance absences, was that the County Legal Counsel utilized the language from Part 115. He noted that any changes to anything would be run through the committee or the chair.

Motion by Tim Nemecek, supported by Kirk Miller, to approve the Charlevoix County Materials Management Planning Committee Bylaws.

#### 7. Work Program Review, Discussion, and Consideration of Approval

Mathew Cooke noted that this work program is the same as presented at the last meeting. He asked members if there were any questions or revisions needed.

Motion by Tim Nemecek, supported by Victor VanDeventer, to approve the Charlevoix County Materials Management Plan Work Program as presented and send to the Charlevoix County Approval Agency for consideration of approval.



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#### 8. Materials Management Plan Discussion

Mathew Cooke noted that the Plan Format from EGLE, is the plan format that we will utilize as a base for the Charlevoix County MMP. He noted that there is a request for proposals out for technical assistance and support with the MMP process, specifically with calculating solid waste rate and finding tonnages and types of materials,

Mathew Cooke said that there will be 3 surveys developed for residents, local units of government, and businesses to respond to. At the May meeting, there will be a draft survey for the MMPC to review and revise. He gave a brief overview of the survey contents but was looking for any comments from members that they would find useful to see or hear from the survey. Mathew Cooke said that the survey will be planned to be released in June through the end of summer. He also asked about community events that staff can participate in to help spread awareness and responses to the survey.

Thoughts included providing the opportunity to sit down with local units of government and business in particular. Tim Nemecek noted that Boyne City has had to look at restricting usage of compost services as they exceed tonnages leading to an increase in costs to the city residents. He asked if there was a way to build in a question about where people in the County are participating. Rose Hissong-Berry noted that there is missing information on volumes, contamination, or materials from the drop off site in Melrose Township.

Additional thoughts included clarifying a question in regards to funding for residents and local units of governments, ways to push out the survey include the ferry and airport to Beaver Island, MSU Extension offices, and local programs like Boyne City Composting.

#### 9. Meeting Reimbursements

Mathew Cooke mentioned that those who are seeking reimbursement are able to claim mileage and meeting per diem. Those interested were asked to stick around after the meeting to fill out necessary paperwork. It was noted that Mathew Cooke will have reimbursement forms on hand at the meetings and that the reimbursements need to be submitted within 30 days of the meeting.



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#### 10. Committee Member Comments

Robin Hissong Berry mentioned that they have a successful metal recycling program which provides them with revenues from the collected materials.

Victor VanDeventer mentioned the possibility of a "field trip" to Beaver Island as theft have a unique situation where everything generated has to be taken off the island.

Eliza Hensel informed the committee that she would have to step away from the committee as she is moving. We will look to fill her requirement as the representative of a composting facility. She also mentioned the option of a subscription based composting program.

Jonathan Scheel adjourned the April 24, 2025 MMPC meeting at 11:34 a.m.

## **ANNUAL MMP GRANTS & REGIONAL INCENTIVES**

- Covers local costs for preparing, implementing, and maintaining MMPs
  - \$60,000 for each county
  - \$10,000/county additional for multi-county planning
  - \$0.50 per capita, up to \$300,000,
    - Cover the higher upfront costs of initiating the new planning process (First 3 years only)
    - \$73,027.00/year for first 3 years



- Contracts for collections should include goals of the MMP
- Include/share **reporting** requirements
- Share knowledge work together
- Agreements or other mechanisms (help to enact)
- Ensure business sustainability/recycling goals are identified in the MMP
- Ensure **ALL goals** are identified in the MMP
- Partnerships
- Think about the future .... help to develop the vision
- Look for **better ways to manage** materials
- Share MMPC notices
- Share education developed from the Planning area
- Advocate for better practices & be a voice to help educate others


#### NEW Materials Management Plans (MMPs) have officially been called for.

New MMPs are in the approval and development process. Materials management planning is a program designed to guide the management of counties' materials, with an emphasis on increasing sustainable practices, such as recycling and composting, in addition to ensuring safe disposal options. These materials can include food waste, yard clippings, recyclables, other source separated materials, and solid waste. The new law establishes statewide recycling goals and standards, and the MMP will identify an implementation strategy to meet those goals.

CURRENT SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLANS WILL REMAIN IN EFFECT UNTIL A NEW MATERIALS MANAGEMENT PLAN IS APPROVED.





- ✓ Recycling is a scalable, costeffective climate solution.






## MICHIGAN MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE COMPOSITION






